Oxigen & Sahyog Foundation Report on Cataract Surgeries:

Delhi, June 2019

"Eyes play an important role in the functioning of human body along with other body organs. Life would be sheer darkness if vision is lost."

NEW DELHI: Oxigen & Sahyog foundation reached out to the underprivileged with a free Cataract eye camp. On May 20th at village Tughlakabad Patients who were suffering from eye diseases benefited from the camp, which saw a turnover of over 209 people with different kinds of eye problems, patients showed up to get them tested. While 13 patients were detected with Cataract, 9 patients showed

keenness to get operated only Four of them turned up on 3rd June 2019 morning turned up to the hospital and have undergone the operation successfully. Rest of the patients back out because of hot weather condition. This initiative was in collaboration with Lions Eye Hospital, Delhi. The sole aim of the camp was to have eye care services at the doorstep of the villagers & Slum dwellers who otherwise couldn't afford the same.

The sequence of steps taken to screen, transport, and conduct the surgery are as follows:

- 1) The patients who come to the camp site are registered
- 2) The patients are screened to determine their eyesight problem

- 3) Those found in need of cataract surgery are tested for inter-ocular pressure
- 4) Patients are then screened for high blood pressure and blood sugar
- 5) The patients who do not have any health complications and are deemed to be in need of cataract

surgery are subjected to a final screening by the ophthalmologist 6) Patients are then transported to the hospital by bus provided by the OXIGEN & SAHYOG Foundation

- 7) The patients are admitted to the hospital and are operated the same day. During the surgical procedure, clouded lens is removed and a plastic intra-ocular lens is implanted
- 8) after staying for few hours, the patients are checked to ensure that there are no complications and are then transported back home.



Patients were grateful to Oxigen & Sahyog Foundation for conducting such surgeries free of cost. They are now able to feel the world once again through their improved visions. Meals and medicines were provided along with a full day's rest at hospital after the surgery. The patients are also provided with post-operative medication, colored glasses and two follow up visits. Proud to Share that Patients were very happy with surgery & the arrangements at hospital.

Oxigen & Sahyog foundation has brought a new ray of hope for the hopeless and helpless people. The patients being operated at hospital acknowledge that with the help & blessings of volunteers rendering selfless services to them more than their own kin they will be able to restore their vision back. The happiness on the faces of patients getting operated in the eye camp can be clearly seen.
